RECREATION GROUND SURVEY

Between now and the end of September, members of the Coaley Rec Action Group (CRAG) will be conducting a brief survey of the usage of the rec. This will mainly involve recording the number and location of people on the rec during a given time period but we might sometimes approach people for more information.

The survey will allow us to better understand the usage of specific areas, such as the play equipment or pump track, as well as more general use. This will then inform parts of funding applications and help to ensure that future design plans don't overlook important needs and wants of the community.

HIGHWAY WOES

Peak Lane is in a sorry state at the moment. The parish council have reported the problems to Gloucester County Council Highways and were amazed to get a report back that no problem was found. We responded with photographs of at least twenty holes and they have sent a safety inspection team to do a full report. The problem we have is that they only consider a hole deeper than 40mm to be worth repairing. Unfortunately common sense doesn't seem to guide their repair strategy. They make no allowance for potholes near each other, the general state of the road or the fact that once the repair team are there it is a minor extra expense to do a thorough job.

We encourage people to report potholes or any other highways problems using the County Council website. Please don't hope someone else will do it. The more complaints they get the more likely they are to do something about it.

We get very poor service from the highways dept generally. We have been trying for nearly a year to get them to provide some signs to direct cars that would otherwise park on the street to the council car park at the rear of the village hall.

We've also been trying to get them to provide signs to prevent large vehicles using the lane to Uley. We have two documented instances of lorries getting stuck on this lane but that doesn't seem to be enough. Please, if you see an unsuitable vehicle using a lane, take a photograph and send it to the Parish Council.

WHO OWNS COALEY COMMUNITY SHOP?

Coaley Community Shop has been trading for 20 years this year. As the long term village residents will know, it started as a result of the village appraisal carried out by the parish council in 1996, which showed great demand for a shop, as there had not been one for several years. The parish council chairman got together a group of villagers to try and start a community shop. They formed the Coaley Shop Association with membership open to all villagers on a single payment of £10. It took a lot of hard work, fund-raising and negotiating with authorities before they achieved their goal. The primary school gave them an old terrapin building and a site was rented from the Village Hall committee. The shop finally opened in 2003.

The past 20 years have seen many changes both in the village and in the way we shop. The building became increasingly scruffy despite our efforts to improve it, and it was also too small to accommodate the services, particularly the social centre we wanted to offer. In 2018 the members decided to try to replace it with an energy efficient, green new building. With amazing support from the residents of Coaley and local businesses both in fundraising and building it, the new shop opened in 2021.

It is still run by the Coaley Shop

Association which now has about 130 members. It is still only a one-off payment of £10 to join. Members have a vote at the Annual General Meeting and can stand for election to the committee. We would love to have more new members to ensure we remain representative, and continue to provide what the village needs from its shop. Membership forms will be available in the shop in August.

This year the AGM is on Saturday September 16th at 10am in the Jubilee room at the Village Hall. To celebrate our 20 years of trading we are offering a loyalty scheme to members of a free hot drink every month.

In May Coaley WI had a fascinating talk from Crime scene investigator Hayley Scott. Hayley spent 14 years with the Metropolitan police where she was a forensic scientist. She worked on over 15,000 crime scenes and all sorts of crimes including burglaries, rape and murder. One case she worked on was solved from an initial break with a discarded cigarette butt providing DNA evidence. Hayley talked about the differences between fingerprint patterns and how CSI look for finger marks at crime scenes (not fingerprints which are intentionally taken). Reports are written at the scene as comprehensively as possible as it can be years before a case comes to court and its not always easy to remember details. Hayley now has her own business giving talks about CSI work and also runs events such as parties on a CSI theme. It was good to see visitors and members enjoying the evening.

We also introduced a survey asking

about people's hobbies and interests which will help us plan future programmes and events.

June saw members and friends board a coach for a trip to Laithwaites in Gloucester for a private wine tasting event with bubbly and red and white wines sampled.

SARA SHARPNESS LIFEBOAT STATION OPEN DAY

The crew and volunteers of SARA's Sharpness Lifeboat Station are holding their 2023 Open Day on Sunday 6th August. The volunteers of this fantastic local charity need your help and

support on the day so they can continue their important work – going to search and rescue emergencies in all weathers and at any time of the day & night, 365 days a year.

Our lifeboat crews need many skills and they will be demonstrating these on the day. You can try your hand too – with emergency first aid activities; quickly puting on a full set of lifeboat PPE; experiencing a highspeed ride on the River Severn in one of the bigger lifeboats. This is an opportunity to meet the crew, talk to them and get a real understanding of their great work.

There will be a fantastic range of activities to entertain the whole family. Children love the excitement of lifeboats and the Open Day will be a day for them to remember. Kids' activities include: lifeboat rides on our lake; the opportunity to clamber over our bigger lifeboats and talk to the brave crews who search and rescue; challenges for kids and their grownups; kids' quizzes; burgers, cakes and soft drinks! There are quite a few things for adults to do and see as well!

Peregrines are the fastest birds on the planet when they perform their incredible diving 'stoops', 198 mph



according to the BTO website. But another bird, the swift, is the speediest bird in level flight. Peregrines use urban environments as the high buildings attract them being the modern equivalents for clifftop sites, with safe nesting situations and plentiful prey. (See Salisbury Cathedral website for camera viewing.) Now is a good time to watch their young honing their hunting skills. So if you have peregrines nesting nearby do remember to listen and look out for the falcon fledglings. Earlier editions of these articles give similar information for about swifts' speeds.

Probably due to poor nesting conditions because of inclement weather earlier in the year some garden birds are having late broods. There is a shortage of food for nestlings as the insect hatchings were also adversely affected by the weather . Providing live mealworms (from local pet shops) will help fledglings to survive. There is an interesting discussion about the world shortage of insects and loss of habitats currently on Al Jazeera TV (Channel 235). Hedgehog hoglets born in May and June can now be seen in some gardens at dusk and they, too, also enjoy a snack of live mealworms as a supplement to their diet of slugs, snails and fallen fruit. Please try to leave them wild spaces and plenty of cover such as fallen leaves, dry grasses and straw (available from pet shops) for them to domesticate. One neighbour who hadn't seen a hedgehog in her garden for at least five years now has three hoglets which visit in the

gloaming for their supper of live mealworms, after which they set off in different directions to forage. They are the gardeners' best friends as they will keep your veg patches clear of slugs and snails and other pests, so they deserve nurturing. Autumn is not too far away and one thinks of the wonderful sight of starling murmurations. An eminent physicist, Giorgio Parisi. (Nobel 2021 Prize winner) has called his recently published book 'In a Flight of Starlings', he writes "Ideas are often like murmurations - they start moving in one direction and end up in another". thus great discoveries are often passed by to be discovered later by others. The book's title is based on the physicist's work in trying to compute the starlings' flight patterns where each bird is aware of its neighbours' movements and the comparisons have helped to increase his own wisdom as applied to Physics.
