NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH CRAG UPDATE OPEN MEETING

Tuesday July 8th at 7 pm in the village hall

Coaley Parish Council are seeking to gain support from residents to



restart the Neighbourhood Watch scheme in the village. This meeting is open to anyone in the village who is interested finding out about how a scheme is operated and those who may wish to be involved in reforming a small team. The village remains registered but needs a team to use this in supporting residents in crime prevention and crime recovery.

Through the scheme advice on crime prevention can be received and passed on to residents, it provides a route into the police and there can be some direct police engagement through community policing initiatives. There is a scheme to provide discounts on security alarms and locks to residents. With the rise in phone/email/social media scams provide advice on how residents can protect themselves and report such incidents.

As with most things, the more effort that we are able to put into this the more the village will get out of it. So please come along and find out more.

SCHOOL UPDATE

In the blink of an eye, Spring Term came to end with Owls Class delivering a wonderful Easter Collective Worship and the whole school immersing themselves in the story of Easter during our Experience Easter sessions in Church.

During Spring Term, six pupils wrote passionately about their interest in becoming a play leader to facilitate sports and activities at lunchtimes. Since their appointment, they have received some training from a sports coach and have started organising games to add a little structure to our lunchtimes. The feedback from their peers has been fantastic and we are incredibly proud of the enthusiasm, organisation and dedication they have demonstrated.

At Coaley, we are aspirational about creating a culture of justice and responsibility to enable our pupils to make ethical choices and be agents of change. We want our children to be inspired by issues that matter most to them and make a positive impact on people's lives and the world we live in. Since January, Purple, Green and Orange House have been working collectively to think about partnerships within our community and issues that matter to them. Orange house voted to organise a sponsored fun run and cake sale to raise money for the Coaley Recreation Action Group, CRAG. Les, a member of CRAG, visited school to share the exciting plans for the development and the difficulties

experienced with sourcing funds for the project. The children in Orange House were so inspired to help make this vision a reality as they could see the difference it would make to all members within the community, they chose to help raise more funds. We are delighted to share that Orange House raised an incredible £550.70 from their fun run and cake sale. Les was presented with the funds during the grand reveal in Orange House's worship earlier this term. A huge thank you and well done to all of the staff, children and wider school family for all of their support. You have made a HUGE difference in our community! The children are looking forward to joining Les for a VIP tour of the area later this term to see what the money will help to fund!

The children of Purple House shared their concerns about the increase in dog poo in the local area, often on the path they walk to get into school. As well as this, they have spotted an increase in litter in the area. To help keep Coaley clean and safe, children of Purple House have been busy drafting and designing creative posters to raise awareness of the increase in litter around Coaley village and the increased amount of dog poo not being picked up. Coaley WI had a fascinating talk from Sue who went on an adventure to Antarctica with a small group of explorers. There were just 35 people on board apart from the crew and they visited many Islands on the way to their destination. They saw 97 bird species and 16 types of mammals and it took 13 days sailing to reach Antarctica. Sue showed us a fascinating video and slide show talking us through the scenes. The seas were treacherous and they could only land if it was safe. One of Sue's most wanted trips was to Scott's hut and they were the only group in the last 3 years to be able to reach it. Her enthusiasm and humour made for a very interesting evening.

In April we heard from the Night Angels/safe space. Chrissie founded the organisation having been a victim of domestic abuse and wanting to help others. The organisation works in Stroud, Gloucester, Cheltenham and Tewkesbury and will soon be in Swindon. Night angels are fully trained volunteers who patrol the towns and cities on Friday and Saturday nights from 11pm to 4 am providing support and guidance to vulnerable people and making sure they get home safely. They work closely with the police who are often working in the same areas. A

safe space is a business or premise where anyone can walk in and ask for help, the staff are trained in what to do to support the individual and the premises are clearly marked for easy identification. There are approx. 60 volunteers and this year so far they have dealt with 257 incidents.

Nationally the WI run a campaign each year on a matter that is voted on by members. This year the campaign is Bystanders Can be Lifesavers

With over 30,000 out of hospital cardiac arrests a year in the UK and less than one in ten people survive, the WI aim to increase public confidence & training in CPR and to work with local organisations to help to improve access to defibrillators in their communities to give every person the best chance of surviving a cardiac arrest.

The plant swap was once again a huge success this year and our cafe was busy throughout the event making a profit of £750. Thank you to everyone who supported us and enjoyed the cakes.

Our memberships were renewed in April and we were delighted to welcome new members to the group. Our fundraising work throughout the year means we are able to subsidise our membership cost to £37 (recommended charge is £51) and new memberships are accepted throughout the year pro rata. This includes a national magazine, regional newsletter and monthly meetings with wine/drinks

on arrival and a speaker. Visitors are always welcome.

The spring was really warm this year providing ideal growing conditions and there was an abundance of plants: a super range of fruits, flowers, vegetables, shrubs and herbs. There was some accessories too. The pots and vases were very popular too!

NURTURE NATURE

SUMMER VISITORS

House Martins: (Delichon urbica – 12 cms) These lovely migrant birds fly from Africa to nest in the British Isles, many in our area. They spend a long time making their mud nests under the eaves of houses. Please be tolerant of their building habits. The birds do not cause too much mess and they become distressed if all their hard work is destroyed. If house martins cannot raise their broods, yet another species will be endangered. According to the RSPB their population has halved since 1969, and they are now on the Red List

Sand Martins: (Riparia riparia – 12 cms)

These migrants can be seen from April to September especially around sand quarries and sandy banks, where they burrow out their nesting sites. Many of their ancestral breeding sites have gone. In some East Anglian areas the local ornithological groups have had built artificial banks for nesting which are well used. A good place locally to see them is Frampton-on-Severn sailing lake. Plumage is sandy brown above and whitish below. These agile fliers make harsh twitter calls in flight.

Swallows: (Hirondo rustica – 20 cms) These beautiful birds always return to their old nest sites, so please ensure access to them. If, for reasons of security, access has to be shut, swallows will fly through small openings in order to reach their traditional nesting sites.

Swifts: (Apus apus – 18cms) Their nesting sites, some of which are centuries old, are fast disappearing, due to development and property maintenance. They require an access tunnel of at least 18" long with a small entrance hole; please don't block them off. Swifts are believed to spend as much as nine months to a year on the wing, and they are known to nap whilst flying. Swifts were added to the Red List in the 2021 UK Conservation Status Report.
