POST POX TOPPERS.

The post box toppers for the Coronation were knitted by two members of the Coaley Knitting. Group. They are in fact a good example of recycling,

The crowns were initially made for the Platinum Jubilee of the late Queen and were refreshed for the coronation. After all, the same crown has been used for hundreds of years to crown the monarch.

The post box toppers of the King and Queen were also remodelled. The figures of the Late Queen were reused to represent Queen Camilla and the footsoldiers from one postbox remodelled as the King.

Patterns were not used to make the crowns but produced from the imagination of the knitters. A basic pattern of knitted Christmas ornaments - a fairy and a toy soldier, were adapted for the royal couple

The red, white and blue rosettes were also reused, being the ones knitted for the Platinum Jubilee. These will be left in place for the Village fete in June.

Annabel grew up in Shropshire and had always wanted to work in the fashion industry which she did starting as a pattern cutter then branching off into millinery. Annabel as done lots of courses and there are lots more available. She used to have an Etsy shop (an on line craft website) but brexit has made this more difficult with procedures and costs for shipping goods abroad. We were able to see designs in various stages and lots of different fabrics and styles as well as ideas for decorating hats such as feathers. Annabel is cautious where she buys her supplies from and likes to make sure they are ethical and good quality. Although many tools are available, Annabel uses a steam iron for manipulating the fabrics and chair legs for bending feathers! It was a fascinating talk with lots of questions and discussion.


this a success and to everyone who came along to join us for teas and cake. Money from these events help us to reduce our annual subs and to pay for speaker and trips along with charitable donations

Our May meeting started with entry into the national WI raffle draw for everyone who bought a ticket for a local raffle. lets hope we have a winning ticket amongst them. Our guest speaker was Hayley Scott who spent 14 years with the Metropolitan police where she was a Forensic scientist. She worked on over 15.000 crime scenes and all sorts of crimes including burglaries. rape and murder. One case she worked on was solved from an initial break with a discarded cigarette butt providing DNA evidence. Hayley talked about the differences between fingerprint patterns and how CSI look for finger marks at crime scenes (not fingerprints which are intentionally taken). Reports are written at the scene as comprehensively as possible as it can be years before a case comes to court and its not always easy to remember details. Hayley now has her own business giving talks about CSI work and also runs events such as parties on a CSI theme.

PLANT SWAP

The plant swap raised a fantastic £882. Many thanks to our growers, stall holders and everyone else who contributed. Money raised will go to Produce Show funds and helps us provide things like the Christmas tree and planters outside the shop.

GARDENS' CUP

The theme for the Gardens' Cup competition this year is "Front Gardens".

Any size front garden can be enteredfrom one or two pots to a grand front garden.

Judging will take place on the afternoon of 2nd July. The judges are expert gardeners themselves and are always willing to answer your questions and give advice. They don't expect pristine exhibition standard gardens and are more interested in what you have made of the space. Modest gardens have won the cup in previous years. If you'd like to enter forms are available in the shop. Judging can take place in your absence if you are away.

How lovely the roadsides and hedges look with foaming cow parsley on the verges and all the hawthorn blossom out in the hedges, great for wildlife. A benefit of the energy crisis as local authorities and landowners cut down on expensive roadside maintenance, unless a danger to road users. Very few hirondines (martins and swallows) have been seen so far this year. However, it was pleasing to note that some householders have erected martin boxes under the eaves. The cold weather killed many garden birds last winter. Wrens are very susceptible to the cold and not many wrens have been seen, or heard this year, the writer has not seen one and a pair used to nest regularly in ivy on a fence. He remembers, when living in a thatched house with deep eaves counting wrens going to roost in a gap in the thatch eave at dusk in winter. One year over twenty were counted roosting together for warmth. The tit species also suffered in the inclement December and January weather. A box used annually by great tits is not occupied this year. This could possibly be due to the box not having been cleaned out in November and a species of wild bee had taken over occupancy. The owner finding out the hard way when putting his hand in without gloves to clean out old nesting material and having to withdraw his hand quickly with half a dozen angry wild bees clinging to his hand.

I think readers will find it noticeable that the garden bird scenario has changed over the last few years. Now, the corvid family, wood pigeons and grey squirrels are marauding garden bird feeders, and are very much more prominent. This phenomenon is upsetting the balance of nature in gardens and there is more predation of nests and fledglings too. Garden bird feeders are not designed for corvids. A rook or crow with its beak like a hammer drill can easily get through even metal feeders. Recently the cock of a nesting pair of blackbirds, in defending its territory, had its leg severed by a rook, and fluttering away was never seen again. The hen blackbird valiantly kept feeding their nestlings for a couple of days until taken by a sparrow hawk and the hungry nestlings were then predated by a grey squirrel. Having written earlier that hirondines appear to be ever declining there are several local locations where swifts have nested for

years, such as in church towers, but have not, and are not returning to these ancestral homes. The success of these migrations depends mainly on the weather. They prefer wet and warm weather for travelling which encourages the hatching of swarms of insects for survival on their passage. Scientists have estimated that a pair of birds can consume some 20.000 insects and arachnids in a day. All these three species however are in decline and in 2021 swifts were added to the Red List of our endangered birds having suffered a 60% decrease over the last quarter of a century. Scientists fear that in time none of these three beautiful migrants will return to these shores.
